I would like to talk about the idea of sowing seeds, but I would like to change the spelling to 'sewing' seeds. I don't want to necessarily change the meaning of what it is to 'sow/sew' a seed. Generally speaking, sowing/sewing a seed requires vision, planning, knowledge and patience. And there is an expectation of an outcome; a fruitful and productive result.

I have loved the process of quilting (well, most of the time) and the results (OK most of the time here as well). As president of our guild, I have a vision that includes embracing renewal and the 'sewing' of seeds that attract newcomers, young people and anyone else who would like to learn a little or a lot about our craft.

I want to focus on the idea of engaging young people into our guild. If we want our guild to not only survive, but thrive, we need to demonstrate to young people that the joy of quilting is a rewarding activity in so many ways. They may need a little guidance from friends, relatives and guild members like us to join our ranks. I believe that a few of the reasons that the participation rate is low among young folks is that they may not really know about it and if they do, they may perceive quilting as something that their grandma used to do. We need to challenge that old 'notion' and construct a framework where members of our guild reach out to the school community for example. Any quilter who has shared tips and tricks and skills IS a teacher already.

Our last Sew Day welcomed Christa V. she is retired RCMP officer who I first met during a quilt



delivery to Victim Services she has since retired and her and husband travel 'with purpose' quite frequently through Rotary. She reported that through Rotary Chilliwack her group recently made a trip to Cambodia and witnessed an Enterprise and spoke to the ladies working there. An Enterprise is one that makes the kits and distributes for a cost to the local population. The ladies make \$2 US per kit and can usually get 2 of them done per day. She reiterated that we can't imagine in Canada how much this means to the ladies to have Menstrual products and make an income for their families. We are always looking for people who are interested in helping with DFG whether you are a Sewer or perhaps just want to label or string the bags!!! If you are interested in the program, please check out the website – we are an international organization - http://www.daysforgirls.org/canada/ Thank you to anyone who contributed fabric and your sewing skills - you are amazing for sharing your skills and fabrics for such a great cause and empowering women!!! Imagine what we could do with MORE helpers!
