I can personally attest to giving out three of your quilts to children on a very serious investigation once. The children came in halfclothed, starving and traumatized. When they left our office with their own quilts, I could tell they felt special, valued and comforted by having something so beautiful to call their own. So a big thank you to all of you for donating these items to our office!

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


