# Jean Jones at Chilliwack Quilters Guild

Chilliwack Quilters Guild have invited PieceMakers to a presentation called Little Things Can Make a Difference by Jean Jones on Monday, March 18th at 1:00 pm in the Lions Hall on Spadina.



In 1876, American astronomer and teacher Ellen Harding Baker created a handcrafted quilt to use as a teaching aid in her lectures.

The incredible *Solar System Quilt* features each element of the planetary system, beautifully embroidered in wool and silk.





The large, 89 x 106 inch quilt was made from black woolen fabric and embellished with colorful wool-fabric appliqué, wool braid, as well as wool and silk embroidery.

Similar to the solar system illustrations in astronomy books of the time, it features the sun at the center, the eight planets of our solar system, as well as the asteroid belt and a myriad of stitched stars.

Earth's Moon, the Galilean moons of Jupiter, as well as a number of moons for Saturn, Neptune, and

Uranus are included as small embroidered dots, and Saturn's rings feature as yellow fabric appliqué.



A large comet in the upper left corner is also included, perhaps representing Halley's Comet, which had last been seen in 1835.

I missed making a report for the last newsletter so you may find this one a bit lengthy.


We did have some new books last month but I am posting pictures with their library number but not the descriptions. I encourage you to check out your library online and read the descriptions yourself.

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
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


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




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


And now on to the new books for March.





Techniques: piecing, curved piecing






pieces 3/4" to 2" wide, turning them into dazzling scrappy blocks and one-of-a-kind quilts.




